8. Regular Items:

8.1 Staff updates

Dan provided the following updates:

- Scooty e-scooter rental service has been launched along the Centennial Path. Positive feedback has been received. Some inquires about speeds but on a high level happy with the provider and ultimate goal is to grow including providing other modes of transportation for rent as well as expanding the area. Staff have regular touch points with Halton Police, local business and Roads, Parks and Forestry staff and they have no major concerns. Staff have connected Scooty with the other municipalities in Halton Region as it would be great to have one micro mobility provider for all of Halton but recognize each municipality will have its own purchasing procedures to follow.
- (Q) What kind of data are you collecting that could be useful to help sell micro mobility in the future (support expanding the pilot)? (A) The data being collected by Scooty includes pick up and drop off location of scooters, how many rides, the length of the ride, the satisfaction and general comments are collected in the app. Staff are planning to provide a report summarizing the data collected from June 2025 to December 2025.
- (Q) Is there a measure of success for the pilot program? (A) This pilot program was launched because it is a big part of the Integrated Mobility Plan (IMP), staff view micro mobility as something that is not going away so as long as there are no major red flags then it is a success, we know that people want options and it is a big part of our transportation systems going forward.
- (Q) Is the long-term goal to be using these e-scooters on the road? (A) Yes, the Province has a pilot on e-scooters until 2029 and are encouraging municipalities to join the pilot and allow e-scooters on the road and then ultimately the Province gets to make the decision if e-scooters will be allowed on road. Other municipalities are already testing them on the road, Burlington does have a goal to expand the micro mobility program which could include on road use.
- (Q) Do you think the e-scooters would be something that would push the Province towards installing bike lanes across the QEW? (A) The more people that are interested in and participate in active transportation it will encourage the local government, Provincial and Federal governments to look at providing facilities.
 - Staff continue to work on Prospect Street, Walkers Line and Plains Road which are the three roads where the protected cycling network is being expanded.

- The committee will be engaged on the Trails Strategy update, the project is looking at the trails network including hiking trails and multi use trails. This strategy will be connected with the Cycling Master Plan.
- Thank you for a successful summer of engagement at multiple events.

- General summary of when/how roads and paths are maintained during the winter. How they are prioritized and by what criteria.
- Questions about connectivity like bike lanes to bike paths? The
 city has a 'cycling spine network' and I think they will have
 questions about how it is maintained as it has been identified as a
 primary bike network
- Process for reporting barriers (snow, poor drainage) along paths or bike lanes?
